# Pasta Dinner and Auction Overcome Snowstorm; Over \$500 Profit Estimated When All Results Are In

In spite of almost six inches of snow in the afternoon and early evening, preceded by a full day of rain, our club's third annual Pasta Dinner and Silent Auction turned out to be reasonably successful on Saturday, March 28. Over \$900 in revenue was raised by dinner ticket sales and the auction of many donated items.

Treasurer **Lion Roger Claxton** says that some expenses are yet to be paid and an unknown amount of ticket-sale money is still outstanding. Final net profit should be somewhere between \$500 and \$600, he said.

The dinner and auction was held at the Overland Park Christian Church, 75th and Conser Streets. **Lion Dale Warden**, a member of the church, provided access to the building—unlocking entry doors, adjusting thermostats, disarming security alarms and similar tasks.

Meatballs and spaghetti sauce were prepared several days in advance by **Lions Dottie Bloome, Mae Claxton, and Carole Collyard** and kept frozen until the afternoon of the event. Tossed greens salad was mixed on site. Desserts were donated by club members and/or their spouses. These were sold separately at \$1.50 per serving.

Lion Roger Claxton went above and beyond the call of duty Saturday when he went home for his snow blower and spent a good part of the afternoon clearing the walkways around the entrance of the building. Unfortunately, laments *Ye Olde Editor*, we didn't get a picture of that essential and much-appreciated bit of work.

Many members and friends of the club donated items for the silent auction.


