"Shoeboxes for Soldiers Follow-up

A June Update Via E-Mail from Iraq

Lion Paul Roemerman shares the e-mail below, sent by his college fraternity brother, Colonel Rob Schmitt. Col. Schmitt commands the brigade in Iraq to which we sent the "Shoeboxes for Soldiers" in March. The photo above was attached. The text of the e-mail follows.

* * * *

It is June and we are getting closer to the end of our deployment. Weather is extremely hot, highs of 120+ almost daily. It pretty much makes the middle of the day tough to be outside getting anything accomplished. Some of our units have changed the work schedule to nights, especially in the motor pools which have no AC. The logistics mission is going well. We are still pushing approx 400-600 vehicles per night in convoys throughout southern Iraq. The British have turned over their operations in Basra to the US and that is going well. June 30th will be a big date as it is the day the US will have the bulk of US forces out of all cities in Iraq per the US/Iraqi Security Agreement.

One of the areas we have also been working is training of the Iraqi Army. Our Brigade has been working with 3 separate Regional Maintenance Centers (RMCs) to train their soldiers in vehicle maintenance and supply. Their soldiers are actually pretty good mechanics as they can certainly tear down and do a rebuild on an engine extremely well. What they lack are parts and a good distribution/requisition system to get the parts. This has been where we are working with them the most. We are training them to use computers and a server-based requisition system to order parts. Two of the three Iraqi units we are working with are now using the computer system very well. The third unit just was stood up near Basra and still needs to be fielded the computer system [sic]. They are learning, and improving every month since we have been here.

Since coming home, I've been busy making plans for future adventures. Coming up real soon is my World War II Bomb Group's Reunion. We'll fly into Paris for two days, go down to the beaches for two days, then make a five-hour barge trip across the Channel to England, back to my old air base at Polebrook. The balance of time will be in and around Peterborough and London.

Early in September, it's off to Mike Ryan's annual three-day golf outing in and around Louisville, Kentucky with friends from all over, many from Canada—this being the 13th year.

I'm contemplating a cruise in January to the eastern Caribbean, and a summer trip down to Branson and Bella Vista, as well as a safari to Laughlin and Vegas, and perhaps a fall trip to California. In between times, I'll probably continue my monotonous routine of dancing.

Other than that, it's the general boredom of an old retiree. Ho Hum!
