Concession Stand and Balloons Score Big Again in 2009 At Overland Park Fall Festival on the Commons

Overland Park Host Lions earned a net profit of approximately \$2700 from their efforts at the annual Fall Festival held on September 27 at the Overland Park Commons. Profit might have been greater except the mild weather probably reduced the demand for cold water and soft drinks. There was also competition from other vendors located nearby who were selling food products similar to ours, particularly hot dogs and sausages.

Again this year, balloons emblazened with the Lions Clubs International logo were a big hit with children at the park. Lion Heather Lanigan suggested that next year a sign be posted stating that the balloons are free. Some parents were reluctant to let their children take one because they thought the balloons were for sale.

A new grill was purchased for this and similar events in the future. It "fires up" more quickly than the old ones, providing a fuel savings because it can be shut off when not needed.

Treasurer Roger Claxton provided a detailed "re-cap" report for the Board of Directors and made suggestions about adjusting the amount of food and other supplies to be purchased for next year's Festival.

Lion Cindy Fisher, a new Lion working this project for the first time said, "I enjoyed the fall festival, in spite of being really tired Saturday evening!"

Candy Day to be October 24 at 135th Street Hy-Vee

Candy Day will be at the Hy-Vee store, 135th and Antioch, Saturday, October 24, after the regular club meeting. The first two-hour shift will begin at 9:30 and the last one will go from 3:30 to 5:30. Four Lions are needed for each shift, two for each entrance to the store. We received \$638 in donations on August 15 using this format. Rolls of candy, mints and sugar-free mints are available.

A sign-up sheet will be passed around at the meeting of October 10. The Calling Committee will contact all volunteers in advance to remind them of their shifts.

Surplus Festival Food Items Will Be Available for Sale To Club Members at Saturday's Meeting

Hot dogs! Brats! Soda Pop! Water! Get 'em while supplies last and at bargain prices.

Surplus food and drink items from the Overland Park Fall Festival will be available for sale to Lions at Saturday's meeting. Prices are: Hot dogs, \$3 per package of 6. Bratwursts, \$17 per package of 25. Hot-dog buns, 50¢ per package of 8. Soft drinks, \$5 per 20 cans. Water, \$4 per 24 bottles. All money from sales will to the club's service (charity) account.

Any food and drink items unsold after Saturday's meeting will be donated to a group home for developmentally handicapped persons for a cook-out or picnic event.

New Community Service Project . . .

Digital Thermometers Purchased for School Nurses

Two new community service projects have been undertaken by our club since the first of this Lions year.

At the request of school nurses in the Shawnee Mission School District we purchased 200 digital thermometers for distribution to needy families. Nurses said that parents were bringing sick children to school to have their temperatures taken because parents couldn't afford thermometers. This in turn increased exposure of other students to various viruses and illnesses. The supplier used by the district furnished the thermometers for \$3.69 each, or a total cost of \$738. Retail prices at local drug stores range between \$9 and \$10 for similar products.

Another New Community Service Project . . .

Club to Sponsor Cub Scout Pack at Apache Elementary:

A second service activity for the year will be the sponsoring of a Cub Scout Pack at Apache Elementary School in Overland Park.

Lion Paul Roemerman tentatively will be our club's representative to the Scout Council, pending completion of the necessary paperwork.

In what might be considered a "vote of confidence" in our club's leadership and service reputation, Lion Carlene Rajala (Shawnee Lions Club) told Beverly Nichols of the need for a sponsoring organization for this Cub Pack, which now has approximately 20 boys as members. Shawnee Lions have sponsored a Cub Pack at another school for the last few years.

Lions Clubs sponsor more Scouting units than any other organization except faith-based groups.

Details on what individual OPHLC members can do to participate in this work will be announced later.

Summary of October Board of Directors Meeting

Meeting held on Saturday, October 3 at Roger and Mae Claxton's home, 10404 Nieman, Overland Park. Called to order by Big Lion Bob Larson at 1:30 p.m.

Approved minutes of Septembr 5 meeting; accepted Treasurer's report for September. Account Balances: Service, \$10467.50; General, \$5518.42.

Received correspondence from Blue Valley West High School Leo Club thanking OPHLC for financial support for trip to Lions Club International Convention in Minneapolis this past summer.

Received correspondence from Lion Andy Hoedl thanking OPHLC (primarily Ron Bloome) for donation of 300 Lions trading pins. Approximately \$70 has been donated thus far to Kansas Lions Sight Foundation from the sale of these pins.

Reviewed "re-cap" and summary of Overland Park Fall Festival activities provided by Treasurer Roger Claxton. Profit was \$2700. This was less than in prior years, possibly due to mild weather and competition with vendors selling similar food and drink products near our booth.

Voted to offer excess food items (soda pop, water, and frozen buns and hot dogs/brats) to club members at cost, money to go back to Service Account.

Approved Lions Carole Collyard, Roger Claxton, Grant Rogers and Neal and Beverly Nichols as committee to look at locations for possible new meeting site.

Reaffirmed decision to hold regular meeting on March 27, 2010 but not to have a guest speaker. Attendance is expected to be small because many OPHLC members and officers will be at District 17-O Convention in Topeka.

Discussed a plan to cooperate with the Leawood Lions Club in determining where each club will place and monitor Lions eyeglass collection boxes.

Approved up to \$200 for purchase of bookcase (or materials for making same) to be donated to group home for developmentally handicappedLio persons.

Received report from Beverly Nichols that 200 digital thermometers were purchased for Shawnee Mission school nurses to distribute to needy families. Cost was \$738 (expenditure approved at September board meeting).



Kansas Lions Have Big Presence in Memphis at Recent USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum



Pictured above are most of the more than 45 Kansas Lions who attended the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Memphis, TN, September 24-26. Nearly 2900 Lions from all over the United States and Canada were registered.

OPHLC members Neal and Beverly Nichols worked in several areas as volunteers—the Host Committee office, the Forum store, and helping distribute "Goodie Bags" and registration materials. Their purpose was to learn as much as possible about the inside workings of the Forum, which will come to Overland Park in September 2013.

Lion Neal (AKA Ye Olde Editor) says, "If I learned anything in Memphis, it is that we can't overemphasize the need for plenty of Lions to sign up as volunteers. Lions from all over Kansas and the surrounding states will have to enlist in huge numbers to make the '13 Forum bigger and better than ever. The Forum in Memphis was great—well organized with outstanding leadership. If there was any weakness, it was that there was a serious lack of volunteers."

Forums will be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin (2010), Anchorage, Alaska (2011), and Tampa Bay, Florida (2012). A strong Kansas Lions' presence in Anchorage to begin promoting the Overland Park Forum is needed. Even more important is to have as many Lions as possible present in Tampa Bay in 2012 because that is where pre-registration for our Forum begins.

In Memphis, over 1250 Lions pre-registered for the Milwaukee Forum! Our challenge is to top that!!

About 60 seminars are scheduled over the three-day Forums. The cover a variety of topics and provide Lions opportunities to develop and improve leadership skills needed at local, District, State, and even International levels of service. <u>ALL</u> Lions—from the newest to long-time and seasoned members—can benefit from attending.

And there's something new every year \ldots plan to go more than once!
