Mobile Screening Unit (Sight Bus) to be at Overland Park Fall Festival in September



The new Mobile Screening Unit (MSU), which many of us fondly remember as the "Sight Bus," is tentatively scheduled to be at the Overland Park Fall Festival on Saturday, September 25.

Plans call for the MSU to be parked at the Matt Ross Community Center and to be open from 8 AM to 5 PM on September 25. Our club is responsible for getting sufficient personnel on board to assist in the various types of screening—not just sight—that will be conducted during the day.

The presence of the MSU should result in a lot of favorable publicity for Lions in this area. Attendees at the festival will see Lions at work. More important, the many free screening processes may reveal health problems that need professional medical attention and treatment.

Lion Carleen Rajala of the Shawnee Lions Club is Zone Chair for north Johnson County and Wyandotte County. She will ask Lions from clubs in her zone to serve on the MSU so that OPHLC members can focus on our fund-raising booth at the Fall Festival.

The MSU is no longer a bus but a fifth-wheel trailer towed by a heavy-duty truck. Joint funding from the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation and the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas Foundation made the new vehicle—along with upgraded screening facilities inside—possible.

A long-term agreement between the two foundations resulted in a pledge from the Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas Foundation of \$500,000 for operating expenses over the life of the agreement.

President Scruggs outlined four major areas of service. In August he wants clubs to "Shine a Light on Youth." In October the emphasis will be to "Shine a Light on Blindness." For November and December the theme is "Shine a Light on Hunger." Next April we're to "Shine a Light on the Environment."

District Governor Michele Hufferd and club leaders from around the district are busy at work laying out plans for meeting the president's goals.
