DUES TO INCREASE IN 2011

The Board of Directors voted to raise dues from \$25 to \$30 per quarter, effective January 1, 2011. Additionally, they opted to eliminate discounts for advance payments.

In order to further boost the general fund, meals will be billed at \$55 instead of \$44 for members who pay by the quarter. Meals will be \$11 per meeting for those who do not pay by the quarter. Please note that meal charges are not considered part of dues.

The purpose of these increases is to help the Club offset a projected budget deficit in the general operating account.

President's Message for October

You have read elsewhere in this issue that your Board of Directors voted to raise our dues to \$30 per quarter, effective January 1, 2011. This is an increase of \$5 per quarter. Meals will be billed at \$55 instead of \$44 per quarter.

This was a painful decision but necessary to avoid a crisis in the general (operating) account.

Let me emphasize, though, that this is only a stop-gap measure. We'll probably get through this year all right, but we'll face the same problems again, especially in the next two years when Lions Clubs International dues are expected to increase by a total of \$4 per year.

The Budget and Finance Committee under the leadership of **Treasurer Roger Claxton** had recommended a larger increase that would have put our general account on sound footing for the next few years, eliminating the need to come back frequently with smaller increases. Committee members also thought that all fund-raising efforts should focus on the service budget—community-focused needs—instead of having our time and energy drained by working to fund internal needs.

The options now before us are to consider more dues increases, to hold fund-raising events, to recruit more new members or a combination of all three.

As a start, a garage sale will be held at the Claxton's home (10404 Nieman Road) on October 15 and 16. All of us need to pitch in, not only by being present to help but by donating items for sale—especially "big-ticket" things such as furniture and appliances.

I had the privilege of sponsoring a new Lion last month. It's too bad he couldn't join our club—but a Saturday morning club was not a "good fit" for him. That's a message we get over and over and over in our recruiting efforts. Lions Ken and Carole Collyard, Bob Larson, Beverly Nichols, Grant Rogers and I attend Chamber of Commerce events and belong to other networking groups. We promote the Overland Park Host Lions in every way we can, but the club's meeting time remains a challenge to growth.

Have you ever considered a "club retreat"? Why don't we take a day to get off by ourselves—with *all* of our members included, not just the faithful regulars—in a relaxed atmosphere and take a long, deep look at our club, its problems and its possibilities. There are well-qualified Lions (experts—you know, *outsiders with a briefcase*) who are willing to come here and help guide the process. We don't have to do it alone. Let me know what you think.

In the meantime—as **Past President Bob Larson** said in his message each month . . . **see you Saturday**!

MOBILE SCREENING UNIT JUST IN TIME FOR ONE GENTLEMAN

Lion Mae Claxton shares a story that illustrates how significant the Mobile Screening Unit [MSU] was in one instance that occurred during the Overland Park Festival:

It is often said that God works in mysterious ways, but I like to think that the MSU and the volunteers that donate their time to screen the public are part of that overall plan. Here is how that plan fell into place to save the vision of one man:

In August, our club decided to sponsor the MSU at late notice and found out that it was indeed available for our proposed date. We called other clubs to help us staff the bus and had representatives from the Leawood, Lenexa, Shawnee and KCK Downtown Lion Clubs, Blue Valley Leos and a KU med student as well as our own members, friends and even a neighbor.

Late in the afternoon, a gentleman and his wife visited the MSU. On registration duty was **Lion Janette Sanders Reh** (retired patient advocate from KU Eye Clinic) who became concerned that his symptoms of flashing lights and blurred vision on the right side could possibly be a retinal detachment. After asking him a few more questions, she was even more concerned and called me over to talk with him. I am a registered nurse that was in charge of a pediatric eye clinic for 15 years and a certified ophthalmic technician before becoming the school nurse at the Kansas State School for the Blind. I asked him the same questions and tested his peripheral vision. He admitted that the symptoms started two days ago.

Her concern was well founded. We both advised the gentleman to go directly to an Emergency room so that an Ophthalmologist could be called in to examine him for a possible retinal detachment.

The gentleman responded that his HMO did not cover ER visits unless it was a life or death emergency and that he could see his doctor on Monday morning. He also felt that emergency rooms were for broken bones, heart attacks and the likes.

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This is what we told him, "Retinal detachments are a bonafide eye emergency. The earlier they are detected, the better the results of retaining good vision in that eye. The best outcomes are when they are detected and treated within 24-48 hours of the first symptoms. The earliest warning signs are flashing lights and blurred vision in a field of gaze that then progresses to a feeling that a curtain is falling over your vision. Retinal detachments can be caused by a variety of reasons, they can happen spontaneously for no reason at all, being over 50, needing thick eyeglasses to see at a distance, high blood pressure and diabetes or trauma." His only claim to any of those was age but he did not look that much older than 50!

He finally agreed to stop at his optometrist at Wal-mart and "if" the optometrist agreed with our concerns then he would go to an ER. I gave him my number and asked him to call me with the outcome, and he agreed. Well, at 8PM, I received a call from him. He had just gotten home after visiting the ER. The ER was also concerned and called in an Ophthalmologist who examined him. A hole in the gentleman's retina was found. Laser treatment was done immediately to stop the progression. The gentleman expressed his profound gratitude and said, "God lets you bump into the people you need when you need them the most".

I wanted to share this story with the Lions Sight Foundation, the MSU committee, Lions clubs who sponsor the MSU and the volunteers that staff them. While you may not have the extensive eye background that Janette and I have, please keep this story in mind. When you hear those kinds of complaints, do not hesitate to persuade that person to seek immediate professional help. Vision is a precious sense and should never be taken for granted. Never delay seeking a professional exam if you experience any symptoms.

Thank you to the Lions Sight Foundation for sponsoring the MSU, and the clubs which bring it to their town. Let's make sure those bumps continue to happen.
