#### Eleanor Craig of Accessible Arts Reaches the "End of the Trail"

**Lion Eleanor Craig**, who has directed the Accessible Arts Discovery Trails program at the Kansas State School for the Blind for the past thirteen years, has finally reached the end of the trail.

Eleanor was program speaker at our meeting on November 27. She said the loss of over \$50,000 in federal grant money, combined with the difficulty of raising money locally, was too much of a barrier to keeping the program going. About \$150,000 is needed to cover the cost of a three-week trek.

The Discovery Trails program began in 1998. Over the years, 90 teen-agers filled 140 van seats (some students went more than once). Ninety adults, including 48 teachers, 18 artists and 10 blindness professionals, assisted in the program.

Students and adults followed 11 westward trails, most notably the Oregon Trail, the California Trail and the Santa Fe Trail. On at least one journey, they followed the Lewis and Clark route homeward. The trips covered more than 28,000 miles. Travelers were on the road for the equivalent of 31 weeks (216 days).

Participating students have made presentations in 36 localschool classrooms and five community events.

Here are edited excerpts of Eleanor's remarks last Saturday.

I want to thank the Host Lions for your companionship in our great adventure. You were among our earliest Lions partners. You were the group most eager to hear about our adventures and to welcome our requests for support.

In our first year, 1998, you helped us commission the creation of a large, three-dimensional map; over the years you provided scholarships for a dozen or more participants; more recently, you have invested in GPS technology for our pioneering teens.

Host Lions have donated time and effort on our behalf. It was Lions Paul Roemerman and Grant Rogers who did research leading to our acquiring GPS units; many have aided and encouraged our fundraising efforts. Lions Neal and Beverly Nichols helped us raise funds from many Lions Clubs in eastern Kansas and to advertise our bid for Pepsi Refresh money. Dozens of you struggled through the Pepsi website to vote for us, day after day as we tried for a Pepsi grant.

You welcomed the Discovery Trails Program to the wider Lions fellowship. You were the ones who gave me the idea to contact Lions all along the trail when we needed safety spotters, weather warnings, local contacts for emergency housing in the event of dangerous storms, a quick meal as we passed through, or an evening social with local teens.

Lion Eleanor included a DVD video presentation of scenes from the 2005 Discovery Trails Oregon Trail trip to give us an idea of the kinds of activities that occurred on these adventures.

Eleanor is a member of soon-to-be-chartered Downtown Kansas City, Kansas Lions Club. The club meets twice monthly at the Kansas State School for the Blind.

President's Message for December

Thanksgiving has come and gone, but I hope we all have an "attitude of gratitude" that will linger on in the weeks and months to come.

There is so much for which to be thankful that it is hard to know where to begin the list. We have only to look around us—here in Johnson County as well as the surrounding metropolitan area and beyond—to realize how incredibly blessed most of us are. No matter which way Lions turn, they see others in need, sometimes

in desperate need. And we step up, devoting heart, soul, and strength to fill those needs.

Here are some of our accomplishments since this service year began in July.

We posted the Avenue of Flags three times. Some of you don't know but we were assisted each time by a local chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) and by Boy Scout Troop 425. This help has been invaluable.

In August we conducted a very successful effort to gather school supplies for children in some of the lowest socio-economic schools in Shawnee Mission. This was a District-wide project and we had help from other clubs in the area. A successful Candy Day was also carried out.

In September we once again ran a very successful concession stand at the Downtown Overland Park Fall Festival. The Kansas Lions Mobile Screening Unit (MSU) was here that day and as has been previously reported, we helped save the sight of at least one person and counseled several others to seek medical advice for conditions detected by MSU screening.

October saw us earn almost \$700 for our General Account through a garage sale at the Claxton's home. Several Lions contributed time and goods to make this successful.

Sometimes we don't think we're noticed for what we do in the city, but in October, the *City of Overland Park called us* to ask that we sponsor a popcorn booth at the "Trick or Treat Trail" on Halloween afternoon at the Matt Ross Community Center. We received donations of \$134, with expenditures of only about \$17. The visibility and good will generated by this event far exceed any cash profit we made.

Some of our members enjoyed Chiefs football at Arrowhead Stadium on October 24 and 31 as part of a District 17-O fundraising activity organized by District Governor Michele Hufferd.

November started off with some of us volunteering to sort food items for one evening at the Harvesters Food Bank in Kansas City.

The "Shoeboxes for Soldiers" project is fast becoming another signature project for our club. This year, with contributions from Lions, school children, church groups and other volunteers, we packed and shipped over 90 boxes to troops in Afghanistan and Iraq and even Africa. This year, the Sun Newspapers called us *before* the event to get information; a nice spread in the paper resulted not only in great publicity, but in soldiers' names being sent to our website from the general public.

We have had some very good programs at our regular meetings they have been informative, inspiration, educational, and entertaining. If there is a downside to any of these positive notes, it is that our meeting attendance is rather flat. Let me encourage you one and all to attend regularly.

NOW—let's enjoy the holiday season by ringing bells for the Salvation Army this Saturday, having Breakfast with Santa (and our kids and grandkids) the following week and enjoying the Nutcracker Suite on December 18!
