In late February, I had the privilege of attending a Faculty Development Institute sponsored by Lions Clubs International. It was held at Oak Brook, Illinois, in a hotel just a few blocks away from our International Headquarters.

I met some incredibly talented Lions from across the United States and Canada. One was **Dr. Mary Sedgwick**, an ob-gyn physician whose blindness was not unexpected but occurred much earlier than had been forecast.

Each of us in the Institute was required to prepare and deliver a 20-minute presentation using the techniques we had practiced over three full days of classwork.

Lion Mary's presentation was on how sighted persons can best assist those who are blind. I'm devoting the rest of my space this month to her words of wisdom, because we can all benefit from what Mary taught the group in Oak Brook.

- Blessed are they who refrain from shouting when they speak to me.
- Blessed are they who talk directly to me and not to someone else.
- Blessed are they who say who they are when entering a room and say hello to me.
- Blessed are they who say goodbye to me when they leave so I am not left speaking to the air.
- Blessed are they who do not hesitate to say "SEE" when talking to me.
- Blessed are they who tap my shoulder gently when they approach from behind or from the side when speaking to me.
- Blessed are they who wait for me to extend my hand before shaking it.
- Blessed are they who place my hand on an object such as the back of a chair when telling me where it is, so I can seat myself.
- Blessed are they who do not leave me in a strange environment without orienting me to it.
- Blessed are they who offer me their arm so they can serve as my guide, instead of grabbing, pulling, or shoving me.
- Blessed are they who come up to me in a large crowd and offer to help me when I appear disoriented.
- Blessed are they who do not embarras me in a group of people by openly referring to my blindness in word or action.

- Blessed are they who read me the menu and its prices and allow me to order my own meal.
- Blessed are they who do not distract my guide dog from being my active eyes.
- Blessed are they who treat me like a human being, for I AM a human being.

#### District Governor's Contest Update for February

Our "designing ladies"—Dottie Bloome, Mae Claxton, and Carole Collyard—along with Roger Claxton, put in an incredible amount of time and travel in planning and preparing decorations for the recent District Convention in Lawrence.

Seven members—those named above plus **Ken Collyard**, **Beverly Nichols**, and **Janette Reh**—attended the convention.

Lion Edson Parker has done a great job in scheduling visitations. Lions Jack McLain and Chris Pucci, along with Lion Beverly and me, have participated in most of the visits. Lions Lynn and Teresa Wolfe are out of town, but have earned us points by visiting clubs in both Alabama and Tennessee!

Lion Beverly has also spent an incredible amount of time and energy working on an LCIF grant proposal, which if accepted, will provide funding for a low-vision-screening project for Kansas. She estimates the total to be between \$150,000 and \$200,000, although that is not final.

Attendance at District Cabinet and Zone Meetings by several of our members has also helped increase our point total.

The key to more points is more participation by more members, especially on visitations and attendance at Cabinet and Zone meetings. Points are awarded for each individual Lion who attends, not just for the club itself.
