Club takes on Heart to Heart Care Kits as service project. Donations needed!

Once again, OP Host Lions are cooperating with Heart to Heart International to prepare Care Kits to be shipped to East Coast areas hard hit by Superstorm Sandy in October.

An "assembly party" will be held on Saturday, December 29 at the home of **Lions Roger and Mae Claxton**, 10404 Nieman Road in Overland Park. Work will begin at 10 AM.

Several items are still needed to help us meet our goal of 50 kits.

New hand towels (30 needed).

New washcloths (50 needed). Towels and washcloths an be bought inexpensively in quantities at "dollar stores."

Shampoo (fifteen-ounce bottles) (Ten needed).

Bars of soap (50 needed).

New toothbrushes (50 needed).

Adhesive bandages (three-fourths or one-inch size, Band-Aids® or similar) 500 needed, 10 for each kit.

Wide-tooth combs (17 needed).

Check with **Lion Mae (913-492-8210)** to see what she still needs. Choose one or more of the items and then bring them to the work party on December 29 (or arrange for someone to take them for you if you cannot be present.

Heart to Heart and Lions Clubs share a passion to help people in need, especially in disaster-stricken areas. Heart to Heart distributes Care Kits to the "front lines." These kits bring comfort, health and peace of mind to those receiving them.

Club Buys Braille Slates and Styli to Help Blind University Students in Ecuador

Our club recently purchased several special slates and styli for blind students at Universidad Salesiana Polytecnica in Quito, Ecuador. The Board of Directors authorized the expenditure at the suggestion of **Lion Kim Morrow**.

These devices are to blind students what paper and pencils are to sighted individuals. In countries such as Ecuador, where computers and other technology are not available, a student can use a stylus to punch Braille characters into the slate, allowing him or her to have the equivalent of a notebook for study.

Prairie Village Lions (prior to merging with us), the Auburn (Kansas) Lions Club and Independence (Missouri) Lions also contributed to the project.
