Slide show highlights January 26 meeting...

Lion Ken Collyard presents program on experiences in India

Lion Ken Collyard was the speaker at our January 26 meeting. He told about his recent trip to India to assist in eye screening for indigent people there.

Lion Ken illustrated his talk with a variety of pictures he took while on the three-week trip. These included shots of the eye-examination clinic and the volunteers working there as well as the more "touristy" pictures of the countryside, city life, housing, and the like.

Ken's guest at the meeting was **Karnail Dulku**, who personally provided the eye clinic at his expense for the people of his "village" and surrounding area. Ken explained that the "village" is somewhat like our cities. Karnail brought doctors from Punjab and other helpers like Ken. Ken referred to one of them, **Gurmit**, from Ottawa, Canada. Eye examinations took place over a 3-day period. Surgeries were performed for over a week after the initial clinical exams. Over 300 people came to the clinic and more than 30 surgeries were performed.

"It was a humbling and enlightening experience for me," Ken said. "Karnail is a giving, loving individual." Ken was recognized by the village as an Honorary "Placque." Government and town officials also came for the event and to meet the "American."

Lion Vern Failor to speak about Yellow Dot program at Saturday's Meeting

Lion Vern Failor (Sunflower Lions Club of Topeka) will be the speaker at this week's meeting (February 9). He will discuss the "Yellow Dot" program promoted by the Kansas Lions Eye Health Programs (LEHP). Lion Vern will explain how a local Lions Club can get involved in promoting and distributing Yellow Dot kits. A Yellow Dot is placed on the rear window of a motor vehicle. Should the vehicle be involved in an accident, the Dot alerts

first responders to the possibility of a medical emergency. They then look in the glove box for an envelope with the driver's medical information and the kind of treatment that should be given in addition to treatment for any injuries.

Lion Vern's presentation will provide many more details about the Yellow Dot program. These will include cost, how to promote Yellow Dots in our city, and working with police, fire and MED-ACT personnel to implement the program. It is a program you won't want to miss as it introduces us to another potential service project.

2012-13 Overland Park Host *Lions' Roar* Honored Again at KS Mid-Winter Rally

The Overland Park Host *Lions' Roar* placed third in this year's state-wide newsletter competition sponsored by the Kansas Lions Public Relations and Media Committee.

Committee Chairman **PDG Denny Smith** (Ulysses Lions Club, District 17-L) presented a "Superior" Merit Award certificate to Ye Olde Editor **Neal Nichols** at the Mid-Winter Rally in Salina on January 19. A \$35 cash prize accompanied the award and went to club treasurer **Roger Claxton** for deposit in the administrative fund.

An "adjudicator" who is a professional in journalism judged all the entries for the committee. Clubs participating in the contest submitted three issues published during 2012. We submitted our September, October and November newsletters.

There were seven criteria for judging, each with a possible five-point maximum. The *Roar* got "5s" in every category except two. One point was deducted for "General Appearance: Does it look good and 'appeal to the eye' of the reader?" Two points were deducted for "Are photos used? Do they generally support the articles?"

The final score for the Roar was 32 out of a possible 35.

The adjudicator, whose identity was not revealed to newsletter editors, wrote "Great content—very informative" on the rating sheet.

Top prize this year went to the *Hays Lions Club News*, a quarterly newsletter edited by **Lion Jean Gleichsner**, who has consistently been among winning editors in the past few years. Second place went to *The Pride of Ulysses*, edited by **Lion Fran Smith**. The *Topeka Tattler*, edited by **Lion Phil Menniger**, placed fourth.
