

Cacophony or Symphony?

One of the most enjoyable experiences for Teresa and me in attending a Kansas Lions State Convention is attending the Kansas Lions Band Concerts. This year's concert at the Kansas lions State Convention in Wichita on June 1

was no exception.

The Kansas Lions State Band is comprised of nearly 200 high school band students representing 112 schools from around the state of Kansas. Band members are sponsored by individual Lions Clubs and the parents of some band members. Friday night's performance was a presentation of individual musical talent, individual instrument sections (trumpet, trombone, clarinet, etc.), and a concert presented by a select group of jazz musicians. The jazz ensemble is the only one for which a "tryout" is required of student musicians.

No auditions are required for participation in the 4-day camp. So individual musicians who may never have played together before and have varying musical abilities and experience are brought together to create an amazing sound of music after only three or four days of practicing together. Of course, this requires a great deal of effort from conductors, coaches, instructors and other volunteers, as well as the high school artists.

With few exceptions, the musical pieces were a symphony of sounds that brought emotions that only come from hearing the tones and notes together that we as human beings find so pleasing. However, there were a few moments where individuals or small groups were "out of synch" with the rest of the band and the symphony nearly become a cacophony.

If it were not for the guidance of the director and the apparent desire of the errant individual or groups to regain the harmonious sound and deliver, ultimately, a most enjoyable experience for those in attendance, including the young musicians themselves, the concert would have been just "another event".

Every one of the young people that I observed seemed to have gained an immense amount of enjoyment from the Lions Band camp experience and appeared to have had a lot of fun. I bet they learned a lot more than just how to develop their musical skills, too.

Providing opportunities for young people to develop as individuals in a group working together to attain a common goal is, to me, one of the greatest services we can provide for the world together as Lions Clubs. I think, sometimes, we might need to provide similar opportunities for adults, as well. Perhaps, then, we, too, might experience more "symphonies" in our world.
