### Three New Melvin Jones Fellowships Presented to OPHLC Members

Three deserving OPHLC members were presented with Melvin Jones Fellowships in the past month.

Lions Steve Weinrich, Teresa Wolfe and Heather Lanigan are the newest recipients of this honor—the highest given by the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Steve and Teresa received their plaques and special lapel pins at the club picnic on June 15. Heather was recognized at the District Cabinet meeting on June 15 and received her plaque at the regular club meeting of June 29.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship program was established in 1973. A donation of \$1,000 to the LCIF allows a Lions Club or individual to name a Melvin Jones Fellow.

Over the years the OPHLC has presented total of 42 Melvin Jones Fellowships. At least three members (one is deceased) have been designated as "Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows" (PMJF) through additional increments of \$1,000 donated by them or on their behalf.

Over \$55,000 has been given by our club or its members to the LCIF for MJFs and other fund-raising campaigns since the MJF program began in 1973.
