Attendance at the MSU was limited because there was not much publicity beforehand. Community Center officials asked that we not widely advertise due to limited parking space at the center.

## KanLovKids Low-Vision Project On Big Screen at Toronto LCI Convention





A Kansas Lions sight project was prominently featured at the Lions Clubs International Convention held in Toronto, Canada earlier this month.

Shown at the top of this column is a "big-screen" picture, one of several about the KanLovKids Low-Vision project being carried out right here in Kansas. Seated center and right are LCIF Chairman Past President Wayne Madden and his wife Lion Linda. The young people are students at the Kansas State School for the Blind. The Maddens visited KSSB last September while attending the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum in Overland Park.

In the lower picture is **Dr. Joe Maino**, one of the participating KanLovKids low-vision specialists. The audio part featured excerpts of an interview he had with LCI staff members at KSSB, also last September. The LCIF segment featuring Kansas was the highlight of the session.

Several other scenes showing various aspects of the KanLovKids project were also shown.

Low-vision examinations have been performed for several years in Kansas, but a \$71,000 grant from LCIF gave more structure to the program and helped pay for specialized equipment and doctors' training. Kansas received the first SightFirst II low-vision grant in the United States from LCIF.

The grant proposal was written by **Beverly Nichols**.

## SafeHome in Overland Park explained by speaker at July 12 club meeting

SafeHome's vision is to create a community free of domestic violence and partner abuse.



Their mission is to break the cycle of domestic violence and partner abuse for victims and their children by providing shelter, advocacy, counseling, and prevention education in our community.

Cynthia described a number of the services provided by SafeHome, including the fact that last year SafeHome provided nearly 18,000 nights of safety for women and children fleeing violent homes.

Other services include a 24-hour crisis hotline, counseling, healthcare advocacy and children's services, all provided free of charge.
