Book Labeling, Eyeglass Sorting



A team of OP Host Lions members spent a few hours on Wednesday, August 6 labeling books for children and sorting eyeglasses to go to Wichita for further processing.

Clockwise from left are Teresa Wolfe, Carole Collyard, Dottie Bloome, Lynn Wolfe, and Beverly Nichols are busy organizing almost 550 pairs of glasses for packing. Two boxes full will be taken to the State Council meeting in McPherson this weekend. From there they will go to the Kansas Lions state office for further sorting, then to one of the correctional institutions. Inmates who have received special training will read the lenses, mark the strength of each one, and re-pack glasses into special trays. After all this, the glasses will be ready to go to Central or South America, to Africa, or Third-World areas where needy, poverty-stricken people will be able to see again.



The "book labeling" involved putting stickers on the inside front cover of 1,700 books to be divided among the three Kansas Lions districts. The labels read, "This book is a gift for you from members of the Lions Club in your community." Books are age-

appropriate and will be given, in many cases, to preschoolers when eye screening is done at nurseryand pre-schools around the state.

The books were purchased with funds raised through a "pound auction" at the State Convention in June where about \$2,100 was collected. Books are obtained from Scholastic Publishers in a partnership with Lions Clubs International (LCI).

This effort is just a small part of the world-wide initiative by LCI to fight illiteracy and to assist in early childhood education efforts.
